COSTUME DESIGNER MIYAKO BELLIZZI

Marty Supreme



Miyako Bellizzi is a costume designer based in New York City. Her career began in the fashion industry and quickly rose in the cinema. Known for her contributions to Josh and Benny Safdie's films, *Good Time* (2017) and *Uncut Gems* (2019), Miyako strives to create real people for the stories told on screen.

She has been nominated for an Academy Award and BAFTA for her work on *Marty Supreme* (2025) directed by Josh Safdie. Additional credits include *War Pony* (2022) from directors Riley Keough and Gina Gammell, which was nominated for 'Un Certain Regard' and a Golden Camera at Cannes in 2022, as well as Durga Chew-Bose's directorial debut *Bonjour Tristesse* (2024). She designed *The History of Sound* (2025) from director Oliver Hermanus starring Josh O'Connor and Paul Mescal which premiered in competition at Cannes.



COSTUME DESIGNER RUTH E. CARTER

Sinners



Ruth E. Carter's career as a costume designer started in the 1980s. After studying at Hampton University, she began collaborating early with director Spike Lee, designing costumes for *Do the Right Thing* (1989) and later *Malcolm X* (1992), which earned her her first Academy Award nomination. She received a second Oscar nomination for *Amistad* (1997) and has built a career that includes *What's Love Got to Do with It* (1993), *Selma* (2014), and *Dolemite Is My Name* (2019), and has worked with directors such as Steven Spielberg, Ava DuVernay, and Ryan Coogler.

Carter earned an Emmy nomination for the television miniseries *Roots* (2016) and an Academy Award for Best Costume Design for *Black Panther* (2018), becoming the first Black designer to win in that category. She won a second Oscar for *Black Panther: Wakanda Forever* (2022). Her subsequent projects include *Coming 2 America* (2021) and *Sinners* (2025), for which she received her fifth Academy Award nomination. Over more than three decades, Carter has accrued over 70 film and television credits. She has also received the Costume Designers Guild Career Achievement Award and a star on the Hollywood Walk of Fame.

COSTUME DESIGNER KATE HAWLEY

Frankenstein



Kate Hawley, originally from New Zealand, grew up immersed in opera and theater. After completing her studies in graphic design, she earned a scholarship to The Motley School of Theatre Design in London, where she studied with renowned teachers such as Margaret Harris and Alison Chitty. This experience sparked her passion for design, which she channels through theater, ballet, opera, and film. Her impressive theater and opera portfolio includes works like *Bitter Calm* and *The Trial of The Cannibal Dog* for the New

Zealand International Arts Festival; *Lucia Di Lammermoor* and *La Boheme* at the NBR New Zealand Opera; *The Love of the Nightingale* for Western Australian Opera; *Blithe Spirit* at Salisbury Playhouse; and *La Boheme* at the Wexford Opera Festival. She also served as costume and production designer for *Albert Herring* at the Aldeburgh Festival.

Hawley's feature film credits as costume designer include her work with frequent collaborator Guillermo del Toro on *Pacific Rim* (2013), *Crimson Peak* (2015) and *Frankenstein* (2025), for which she is nominated for an Academy Award, and is the winner of the BAFTA and the Costume Designer's Guild award for a period film. Hawley also designed the costumes for director David Ayer's *Suicide Squad* (2016) and Doug Liman's *Edge of Tomorrow* (2014). She received an Emmy nomination for *The Lord of the Rings: The Rings of Power* (2022).

COSTUME DESIGNER DEBORAH L. SCOTT

Avatar: Fire and Ash



Deborah L. Scott is an Academy Award–winning costume designer. Most recently, she partnered again with director James Cameron for *Avatar: Fire and Ash* (2025), the third installment in the groundbreaking franchise. For this film, Scott and her team spent years developing intricate textiles, beadwork, and embroidery that blend traditional handicraft with cutting-edge digital technology. Scott’s long-standing collaboration with Cameron began with *Titanic* (1997), which earned her the Academy Award and

BAFTA for Best Costume Design. She also designed costumes for *Avatar* (2009) and *Avatar: The Way of Water* (2022), helping to shape the visual language of one of cinema’s most ambitious franchises.

Her career includes collaborations with director Steven Spielberg on *E.T. the Extra-Terrestrial* (1982) and *Minority Report* (2002), as well as seven films for director Michael Bay, including *The Island* (2005), *Transformers* (2007), and *13 Hours: The Secret Soldiers of Benghazi* (2016). Her additional credits include *Back to the Future* (1985), *Legends of the Fall* (1994), *Heat* (1995), *The Patriot* (2000), *Love & Other Drugs* (2010), and *Aloha* (2015). In 2023, she received the Costume Designers Guild Career Achievement Award.



COSTUME DESIGNER MALGOSIA TURZANSKA

HAMNET



Malgosia Turzanska was born and raised in Krakow, Poland. She earned her BFA in Costume Design from DAMU in Prague and her MFA in Costume Design from NYU's Tisch School of the Arts. Her work spans independent film and prestige television, distinguished by its strong visual storytelling and meticulous attention to detail.

For television, she designed Season 1 of *Stranger Things* (2016) and Lulu Wang's miniseries *Expats* (2023–2024), starring Nicole Kidman. Her film credits include David Mackenzie's neo-western *Hell or High Water* (2016); David Lowery's *Ain't Them Bodies Saints* (2013) and *The Green Knight* (2021); and four collaborations with director Ti West: *In a Valley of Violence* (2016) and the A24 horror trilogy *X* (2022), *Pearl* (2022), and *MaXXXine* (2024), starring Mia Goth. *Pearl* has since inspired countless Halloween costumes. Most recently, she designed two of the 2026 Best Picture nominees: Clint Bentley's *Train Dreams* and Chloé Zhao's *Hamnet*, starring Paul Mescal as William Shakespeare and Jessie Buckley as Agnes. She lives in a tiny hamlet in upstate New York, where, when not working in film, she creates textile sculptures and delightfully impractical furniture.



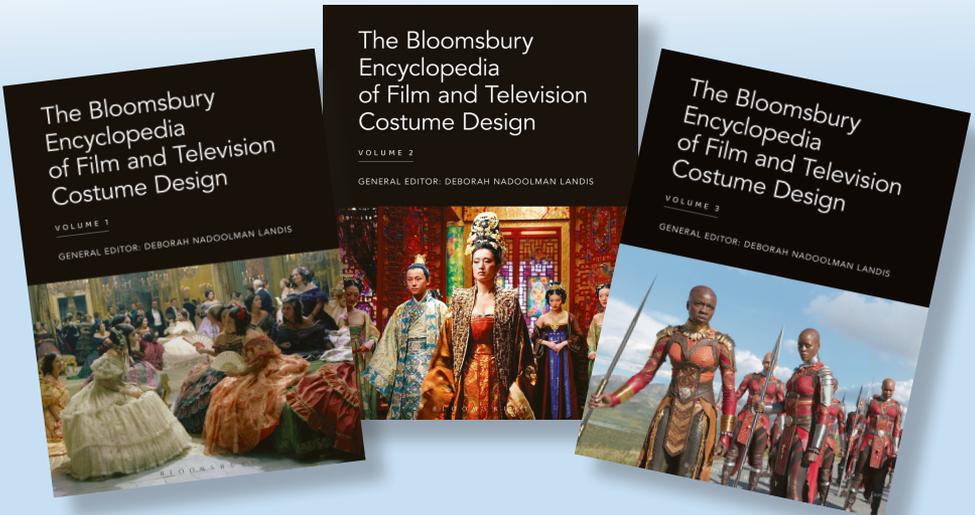

DEBORAH NADOOLMAN LANDIS, PH.D.



Costume designer and historian, Distinguished Professor Deborah Nadoolman Landis, Ph.D., is Chair and Founding Director of the David C. Copley Center for Costume Design at the UCLA School of Theater, Film and Television. Landis received an M.F.A. in Costume Design from UCLA and a Ph.D. in the History of Design from the Royal College of Art, London. Her distinguished career includes *Animal House* (1978), *The Blues Brothers* (1980), *An American Werewolf in London* (1981), *Raiders of the Lost Ark* (1981), *Trading Places* (1983), *Coming to America* (1988), for which she received an Academy Award nomination, and the groundbreaking music video *Michael Jackson's Thriller* (1983).

A two-term past president of the Costume Designers Guild, Local 892, and past Governor of the Academy of Motion Picture Arts & Sciences, Professor Landis is the author of six books including *Dressed: A Century of Hollywood Costume Design* (2007), *FilmCraft: Costume Design* (2012), *Hollywood Sketchbook: A Century of Costume Illustration* (2012) and the catalogue for her landmark exhibition, *Hollywood Costume*, which she curated at the Victoria & Albert Museum in London. She is the editor-in-chief of the three-volume *Bloomsbury Encyclopedia of Film and Television Costume Design* (2026-7) and a revised textbook version of *Dressed: The History and Practice of Hollywood Costume* (2027). www.deborahlandis.com

DEAN CELINE PARREÑAS SHIMIZU, M.F.A., PH.D.



Celine Parreñas Shimizu, M.F.A., Ph.D., is Dean of UCLA School of Theater, Film and Television and Distinguished Professor of Film, Television and Digital Media. A filmmaker and scholar, Dean Celine has authored four books on race and representation in media — most recently *The Movies of Racial Childhoods* (Duke, 2024), recipient of the 2026 Outstanding Contribution top prize award from the Association for Asian American Studies. Her writings have been translated into French, German, Italian, Portuguese and Spanish.

Her films *80 Years Later: On Japanese American Racial Inheritance* (2022) and *The Celine Archive* (2020), both distributed by Women Make Movies, have screened at over 70 film festivals and won 30 awards. Her latest film, *So To Speak*, is currently on the festival circuit. She holds a Ph.D. in Modern Thought and Literature from Stanford University — which inducted her into its Multicultural Alumni Hall of Fame — an M.F.A. in Film Directing and Production from UCLA TFT, and a B.A. in Ethnic Studies from UC Berkeley.
